# FOREWORD FROM PRESIDENT DIRECTOR

PT Bhimasena Power Indonesia develops, constructs, and operates Coal Fired Power Plant 2 x 1,000 MW in Batang Regency, Central Java Province ("CJ CFPP") become the first power project in Indonesia with Public-Private Partnership ("PPP") scheme. It is our vital mission to be strongly committed to sustainable community empowerment through multi-stakeholder partnership, synergy with government program and local community engagement, in addition to stable supply of electricity to this country for years as a national electricity infrastructure project.

High standard social mitigation programs which are comprised of comprehensive CSR programs have been implemented through good governance, transparency, accountability, documentation, and participation to empower the local community surrounding us to expedite its economic and social growth as well as to reinforce partnership and trust with our local community. Implementation of BPI CSR program intends to improve social empowerment comprehensively with handin-hand and bottom-up approach based on community needs, local socio-cultural conditions and synergy with government programs.

Our efforts have resulted in substantial development in our community engagement activities. By December 2022, BPI has developed 206 Micro Entrepreneurs Group (MEG) with the number of members reaching 2,930 people covering 14 affected villages. In addition to growth in the number of groups and members, microbusinesses have also grown in more diversified wavs includina micro-financing services, services, tailor, production of goods, home industry, and agribusiness by the members. The growth of microbusinesses by the community and households through BPI CSR programs is expected to bring an additional income to the members on top of their main livelihoods as farmers and fishermen. Furthermore, it is expected to enhance the economic growth of the community.

Meanwhile, education program has also been promoted as main pillars of our CSR programs. We recognize that education and access to information are important driving forces for the development of society. Therefore, BPI has promoted its literacy program through the Village Library Program, in which 15 village libraries and 33 mini libraries in 15 villages are already in operation under the government supported program to increase literacy of the community. The program offers not only books but also access to various information by utilizing computers with internet access installed at the libraries. We expect that the establishment of libraries in every corner of the village will make a breakthrough for the community's access to a source of knowledge.

Under the health program, BPI has participated in revitalization of the village health forum (FKD) which had been suspended for long time. Mobilizing FKD, with providing series of trainings and resources to improve the capacity of village health personnel, is expected to support the quality improvement of public health. Clean & healthy life programs are also promoted to the affected communities through the government led Open Defecation Free Program (ODF), stunting prevention, clean & healthy movement and its awareness campaign, regular and consistent capacity building for medical services, and improvement of integrated village health post (Posyandu).

The success of BPI CSR program cannot be achieved without cordial collaboration and partnership with various key stakeholders. Furthermore, involvement of all stakeholders is essential for success of the program. Taking this opportunity, we would like to convey our sincere gratitude and the highest appreciation to all members of Batang community, especially the affected villagers around project site as the main players and beneficiaries of our programs. Through various BPI CSR programs jointly implemented and improved with the communities, BPI will empower Batang community for sustainable development and create a harmonious life together.



PT Bhimasena Power Indonesia (BPI) is a joint venture company established by a consortium of three companies of Electric Power Development Co., Ltd. (J-Power) (34%), PT Adaro Power (34%), and Itochu Corporation (Itochu) (32%). BPI builds, owns, operates, and transfers Coal Fired Power Plant 2 x 1,000 MW in Batang Regency, Central Java Province ("Central Java CFPP") which supplies electricity to PT PLN (Persero). Central Java CFPP is the first project infrastructure project in Indonesia, and categorized as National Vital Objects. The project plays a notable role in

facilitating infrastructure development and will fulfill a portion of the electricity needs growth. On 6 June 2016, BPI achieved its financing close. The total investment for this project is approximately US\$ 4.2 billion with total funding received from creditors with total US\$3.4 billion coming from Japan Bank for International Cooperation (JBIC), and bank syndication consisting of ten commercial banks. CJ CFPP commercially operational on August 15, 2022 (Unit Commercial Operational Date) and August 31, 2022 (Project Commercial Operation Date)


# **Developing Community Business/Micro Enterprise Group (MEG)**

MEG Program is developing or strengthening local community microbusinesses, to improve additional income. MEG program development is based on locally demanded businesses, availability of market access (off-taker) and feasibility of supply chain, to ensure business sustainability.



#### **Development of Micro Enterprise Group (MEG)**


MEG development is conducted through the process below:

MEGs have been developed in dispersed affected villages and most MEGs members are originally from the main affected villages of Ujungnegoro, Karanggeneng and Ponowareng.




Figure 8: MEG program development based on business type




Figure 10: MEG cumulative member development since 2013 (individual)




Figure 11: MEG member location distribution among affected villages









Since 2013 until now, from total 206 MEG, there are 101 MEGs with saving loan business type, supported by BPI CSR program. Through supported revolving fund for saving loan MEG, there are many MEGs consistently operated up until 10 funds revolving (approximately 10 years), cumulatively earned Rp 1,577,150,000 which distributed as MEG member dividend & retained earnings. This indicates that saving loan MEG is appreciated & receives positive respond from affected communities.

# CJ CFPP Construction Worker Demobilization Program

As part of construction worker demobilization program to fulfill BPI AMDAL obligation to facilitate new entrepreneurship creation for native worker from 13 villages in vicinity of BPI that will be demobilized at the end of construction phase, BPI CSR has implementing series of entrepreneurship development activities below:



Total person that has joined MEG program for business startup or strengthening existing business are 743 persons, consist of two categories which are local construction worker directly and through their direct spouses.





#### 2. Supporting Businesses Infrastructure and Entrepreneurship Training

Implemented program strategy for developing microbusinesses for demobilized CJ CFPP construction worker is through supporting businesses infrastructure for 67 demobilized workers in three main affected villages of Ujungnegoro, Karanggeneng, and Ponowareng.

During implementation, BPI collaborated with Indonesia Infrastructure Guarantee Fund (IIGF) CSR program, a state owned enterprise, and implementing partner of MFI Berkah Jaya (BPI assisted cooperative), to ease the channeling support for beneficiaries.

Series of program activities to ensure maximum program benefit for CJ CFPP demobilized workers businesses such as data verification, supporting business capital & infrastructure, technical assistance & distribution, technical training & mentoring, were implemented.



#### 4. New Job Opportunity

#### Wadimor sarong box assembly

Since June 2020, BPI CSR program has facilitated household-based new job opportunity in cooperation with PT Sukorintex, Batang textile industry as Wadimor sarong brand producer, the type of job that could be implemented by community around BPI. The production process does not require special skill, which is sarong box assembly, furthermore, interested community will get training, could directly work, and earn additional income.

Since June 2020, sarong box assembly has been implemented by 228 members from 26 MEGs with total production until December 2022 is **4,125,765** boxes cummulatively.

Consistently, BPI has implemented various kinds of training for MEG member community based on their preference & requirement. In 2022, 401 MEG members have received training. Therefore since 2013 cumulatively, 4,589 MEG members have received various training.




Figure 12: MEG member attending various training courses cumulatively

Beside supporting in form of training and capital, BPI is also supporting production equipment and other business support.





# Developing Microfinance Institution (MFI)

To support MEG program development and to support community business development surrounding BPI, MFIs are developed to provide micro loan and other financial services for affected community businesses, as well as nurturing community saving culture. MFI program started in early 2013 and up until now, there are two MFIs development i.e., developing three conventional cooperative MFIs and Grameen Bank model micro financing cooperative. These four MFIs up until 2022 are still actively operating in sustainable way to provide financial services to affected community.

# Three saving-loan MFIs (conventional cooperatives) in three villages

BPI has been supporting the development & operational of three MFIs since 2013 up until now in form of MFI pre-development, permit, launching, series of training & other capacity building & technical assistance. The three MFIs (Ujungnegoro Makmur Sejahtera, Mitra Karya Karanggeneng, & Berkah Jaya Ponowareng) have been developed & operated since 2013 through series of MFI program development activities:






Figure 16: Growth of community saving participation in three MFIs since 2013 (in billion)




Figure 17: Three MFIs annual profit progress since 2013 (in million)



# **Temporary Job Creation**

Community surrounding BPI that directly affected by BPI's land acquisition are tenant-daily farmer and jasmine picker. Therefore, BPI provides opportunity besides becoming entrepreneur in MEG program, but also various kind of simple, temporary & manual jobs that could be conducted by them in available jobs.

Besides, BPI will support micro business by introducing & facilitating access to market, so tenant-daily famer and jasmine picker could produce additional income through:

- a. Jobs surrounding site location
- b. Other supporting work
- c. Through microbusinesses
- d. Form of temporary job creation is microbusiness of home/snack production such as laundry, grocery bag, trash bin, tailor product etc.

To support community microbusinesses since 2016 – 2022, BPI has supported tailor-based MEG to receive various job orders from more than twelve off takers such as: women dress, bag, Islamic praying dress, pillow sheet, man shirt, towel, BPI souvenir like goodie bag, cloth face mask, organizer, pouch etc. with cumulative production for 687,776 unit, resulting earning of Rp 773,836,000 for tailor-based MEG surrounding BPI.

Meanwhile for *rinjing* bag production, MEG has produced various orders from one off taker such as trash bag, laundry bag, grocery bag, with cumulative production of 3,176 unit, resulting in earning of Rp 20,095,000 for *rinjing* bag MEG surrounding BPI.




Further for laundry business MEG, BPI CSR program has developed thirteen laundry MEGs in ten affected villages, consisting of 97 members, have cumulatively processed 104,192 kg of laundry, with cumulative resulting earning of Rp 520,960,000 for laundry MEG surrounding BPI.

# **Supporting Health Improvement Program**

Supporting health improvement programs has been conducted through series of implementation programs since 2012 are mass medical services, series of program has involved village health volunteer through sustainable additional food (PMT), supporting medical equipment, capacity building, supporting revolving fund, and since 2017 through partnership with PKBI Central Java for revitalizing village health forum (FKD).

Through independent sustainability efforts from each village health volunteer, supplemental food requirement has been fulfilled by their income generation from MEG saving-loan businesses.

Since 2014 – 2022, BPI CSR program supported fourteen village health volunteer MEG in form of revolving fund for saving loan businesses within village health volunteer. The resulting profit is mostly utilized to provide healthy nutritious food for 57 village health posts in 14 affected villages. Cumulatively, saving loan business for fourteen village health volunteer MEG have earned Rp 813,404,000.

From the above cumulative earning, Rp 445,791,950 has been distributed as healthy nutritious food support for 57 village health posts in 14 affected villages. While the remaining earnings are utilized as dividend and retained earnings.



#### Supporting health equipment

Since 2013, BPI has supported 994 packages of health care equipment for village health volunteers & village midwife in 14 affected villages to replace and complement the incomplete & damaged health equipment's.

#### Campaign of Movement for Community Clean & Healthy Living

The program is developing village community culture of clean & healthy living through awareness campaign & informing to the community to always enact community movement of clean & healthy living through promotive & preventive media campaign for health services in the vicinity of company. BPI supports 57 village health posts in 14 affected villages, two sub district health clinics in Tulis & Kandeman, improving their health services through promotive & preventive media campaigns.









#### **Supporting Prevention & Reduction of Stunting Cases**

Based on government of Indonesia 2022 data for recording & reporting of community-based nutrition (e-PPBG), Batang district stunting cases is 13.45%. However, based on study of Indonesian nutrition status (SSGI). However, based on study of Indonesian nutrition status (SSGI) is 21%.

To support Batang district government program, BPI is committed to prevent & reduce stunting cases. In total of 205 beneficiaries in five affected villages of Ujungnegoro, Karanggeneng, Ponowareng, Wonokerso, and Depok, have been supported their additional nutrition.

Strengthening Village Health Forum (Bima Sembada)

Bima Sembada stands for Bersih, Makmur, Sehat, Masyarakat Berdaya (Clean, Prosper, Healthy and Community will be Empowered). This program movement will be focused on village health volunteer capacity building and village health forum (FKD) strengthening through capacity building and technical assistance for Open Defectation Free (ODF) campaign, integrated wastewater management, family medicinal herbs garden & re-greening program.

FKD is governmental program which objectives, to develop village community concern & resiliency to prevent & solve health issue, disaster & health emergency independently, to manifest healthy village.

Affected villages in the vicinity of BPI have already developed FKD. Through this program, BPI supports the existed FKD capacity building to develop their competence to implement their developmental objectives.






Figure 23: Environmental health-based training participant in time series



The program aims to develop enjoyable school environment and intensive community involvement, to support education, teacher & student, to enjoy process of educating & learning. Therefore, the objective of school education is to improve all school human resources.

In total 271 teachers from nineteen Adiwiyata schools in ten affected villages have been participated school development program.




Figure 26: Community participation & engagement in utilizing 15 village libraries










# **Ecosystem Restoration**

#### **Re-greening Program**

Since 2013, BPI has been implementing various re-greening/reforestation programs, involving surrounding community in form of reforestation program of 5,03 Ha inside CFPP area, shading tree planting on Sigandu-Ujungnegoro coastal road, planting around schools through Adiwiyata school, Village Health Forum/FKD, Village Library, and Forest Farmer Group.

#### **Green Belt Planting Program**

BPI implements coal handling program to manage its environmental impact from coal stockpile & FABA (Fly ash & Bottom ash) disposal during CFPP operation phase through tree planting program (green belt program), which functioning as absorbing & smell repellant in form of thick & tall tree vegetation line, located on power block fence.

BPI collaborates with Central Java Forestry branch IV Pekalongan (CDK IV), three microenterprise groups of MEG Berkah Jaya-Ujungnegoro, MEG Langgeng Jaya-Karanggeneng & MEG Setya Sejahtera-Ponowareng, and community-based disaster reduction group West Roban SIBAT- Kedungsegog.

The first phase of community-based green belt tree planting program has been implemented in 2,380 m2 BPI land with 2,659 planted seedlings.

#### **Coastal Ecosystem Restoration**

BPI collaborates with Diponegoro University, Semarang (UNDIP) through financing support from 2022 Kedaireka Matching Fund (MF), Ministry of Education, Research & Technology. The collaborative project is The Technology Application for Coastal Ecosystem Rehabilitation Through Artificial Patch Reef Installation from Coal Bottom Ash & Fly Ash (FABA)-Based Concrete for Developing Blue Economy in Batang District.

The project utilizes CFPP FABA, serves as concrete material to construct Artificial Patch Reef (APR) and Artificial Fish Apartement (AFA), in accordance to government regulation number 22 year 2021, to utilize FABA as non-hazardous waste to be used by CFPP or other parties as substrate substitute material or as development of science & technology.

During implementation, the project involved ninety UNDIP internship students, one research student, six lecturers & thirty village communities. Further the project constructed & installed 412 AFA modules & 4 APR units in Batang coast of Karang Sebapang and Karang Ban.


#### Fish Apartment (FA)


**Fish apartment** is artificial habitat which installed underwater to improve unproductive fishing ground therefore can increase fishery production and give sustainability benefit for fisherman. It will provide shelter for small or juvenile fish and big fish with consumed sized in surrounding fish apartment to be cached by fisherman.

FA installation is a government program and BPI supports this program by increasing the number of FAs from 2016-2022:

# **Trash Management Village-Based**

Trash management, either organic or inorganic at village level, is an important program to reduce an increasing number of accumulated trashes in the community. Therefore, BPI developed trash banks program in 14 affected villages in the vicinity of BPI as one of the solutions for community trash management.

The development of 14 trash banks was going through series of processes in partnership with Batang Environment Agency (DLH) and Batang trash bank communication forum (FKBS) through a series of activities below:





Figure 35: Growth of trash bank weighing result (Kg)






Figure 37: Growth of trash bank member (person)

### 3R (Reduce, Reuse & Recycle) Trash Management Program Village-Based

Beside organic and non-organic trash management, 3R (reduce, reuse & recycle) trash management program is one of the solutions for trash issue and impact. Through 3R trash management, not only reducing environmental pollution, but also producing valuable economical products from trash management such as organic compost.

BPI CSR program supported Ponowareng village owned enterprise (Bumdes), trash management group (KPS) Depok village and assisted by Batang trash bank forum (FKBS), to support local government program in trash management. Series of program supports consist of comparative study, training, infrastructure support and technical assistance for trash management.









# **Organic Compost Production**

Organic trash is rarely managed & utilized optimally by the community. Most organic trash is burned and therefore causing environmental pollution.

Through partnership between BPI and village trash banks, Ponowareng village owned enterprise, trash management group of Depok, Batang trash bank forum, organic trashes are managed & utilized into organic compost with series of activities of socialization, compost production training, capital expenditure, technical assistance, and infrastructures.

The existence of FKBSD is an effort toward program sustainability and initial step to develop program to empower & strengthen further 14 trash banks such as regular trash banks administrator coordination, capacity building for trash management.




#### **Social & Humanitarian Donation**

#### **Social & Humanitarian Donation**

BPI is supporting social donation program for vulnerable communities in partnership with local partners of three MFIs and five village health volunteer MEGs in eight affected villages.

The program covered vulnerable community to fulfill BPI Environmental & Social Impact Assessment (ESIA) that identified individual community that lives in extreme poverty such as: having no close relative, older with no capacity to produce income/depend on social donation from surrounding, physical disability etc.

Currently 119 vulnerable individuals have been identified through multiple sources. The program provides staple food & healthcare check on monthly basis since October 2016.



# **ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT ASSESMENT MONITORING SURVEY (RKL-RPL)**

- To determine implemented environmental management effectiveness, on a regular basis BPI conducts environmental management monitoring survey (RKL-RPL) as compliance manifestation report to authority.
- · Environmental management monitoring survey during 2022 was cooperated with PT Sri Bangun Buminitiya Jakarta.
- · Spesifically on monitoring in social, economic, and cultural aspect every 3 months.
- These monitorings were conducted through interview using questionnaire, and in-depth interview to 305 respondents from various community leaders.





Figure 39: Community engagement assessment in skill improvement activity


The lowest percentage occurred in the January-March 2019 monitoring period, which was 67.87%, while the highest percentage occurred in the July-September 2021 monitoring period, which was 94.43%. In the July-September 2022 period, 74.10% said "Good and Fairly Good" and 82.69% in the October-December 2022 period.

#### 2. New Entrepreneurship Facilitation Program Assesment




During the monitoring period July-September 2022, 83.28% and in the October-December 2022 period as much as 88.20% of respondents gave an assessment of "Good, and Adequate". Respondents who answered "Good, and Fairly Good" were respondents who felt they had received assistance and facilitation for new entrepreneurs, not only in this period, but since previous periods.

#### 3. Changing Income Level



Since monitoring in 2019 until the monitoring period July-September 2022, generally respondents who stated that there was an "Increase in incomes by <25%,  $\ge25\%$ -<50%, to >50%" during the construction phase tended to increase compared to at the start of monitoring in 2018. Overall, in the July-September 2022 period respondents stated that there was an increase in income during the construction phase numbered 38.03% and 40.33% in the October-December 2022 period.

#### 4. Intensity of CSR Development Program Implementation at the CFPP Operational Stage



According to the survey results, 58.36% of respondents the July-September 2022 period and 59.35% of respondents in the October-December 2022 period gave good and adequate responses to the implementation of CSR programs carried out by actors.


#### 5. Opinion of the fish apartment engineering



Since the beginning of monitoring (January-March 2019) until period of October-December 2022, all respondents (100%) stated "Very Good, Good, and Quite Good" on fish apartment engineering supported by The Initiator. According to respondents, the "Very Good, Good and Quite Good" rating were given because the fish apartments were places for the gathering of fish, the spawning of fish, increase in quantity of fish, and were spots for fishing.

Fish apartments built by the Initiator are different from FAD. FAD is a tool to help collecting fish in the process of catching fish while the fish apartment has a function as spawning ground for adult fish and / or the area of protection, care and rearing for eggs, larvae, and juveniles (nursery ground) which aims to restore the stock of fish resources. Fish apartments are preserving nature, so they are not accompanied by fishing gear like a FAD. Fish apartment is expected to change the paradigm of fishermen from initially go to sea to look for fish to go to sea to catch fish, because the existence of fish apartments provides a definite fishing location, to save time and operational costs.


#### 6. Impact to Tenant Farmer Income



With regards to the change of income, the trend stated by the tenant farmers during each monitoring period was their income tends to increase, and some others stated that their income remained the same either before or after the construction of the CFPP activities.


According to respondents, the income of tenant farmers had increased because there were tenant farmers working at the CFPP or their family members working at the CFPP.

#### 7. Impact on Daily Farmer Income



Regarding the change in income, some daily farmers added that their income had increased, but most of them stated that their income was the same both before the CFPP construction activity and after the CFPP construction activity.

#### 8. Effect of CFPP Project on Future Public Health Problems



Public perception arguing that the CFPP project was "Not Disturbing" health in the future tends to increase. In period of January-June of 2018 was 59.14% respondents stated that the CFPP project was "Not Disturbing" health in the future. At last monitoring in the period July-September 2022, number of respondents stated that the CFPP project was "Not Disturbing" health in the future was increased to 74.53% and in the October-December period it was 81.25%.

# **BPI CSR PROGRAM IMPLEMENTATION-STUDY RESEARCH**

As a form of monitoring and evaluation to implemented CSR program impact, BPI facilitated undergraduate & graduate student to conduct research study in affected villages.

During 2022, there was no university student research for BPI CSR program implementation.
